Dear Lake Toxaway UMC Family and Community,

"We are debtors." That is the opening statement for the Epistle lesson this week. We are debtors. While I am not using this text for a sermon this week, it is appropriate to highlight the Apostle Paul's statement. Paul reminds the Church in Rome that they and thus, we, are not alone. If we were fully self-sufficient, self-made, self-actualized, then we would not be in debt to anyone or anything. But Paul declares the opposite, which means on one level at least that we are in relationship. Simply by living in the world, we are in relationship. We can ignore it; we can deny it; we can feel it is not so; as we wrestle with our loneliness and boredom, but to exist is to be in relationship.

Our worship, then, ought to be a celebration of relationship: first with God; we are debtors to God, who gave us the gift of life and the gift of salvation. So, our worship has songs which give thanks to the Creator and Redeemer God. We celebrate this gift as we sing and pray, acknowledging that we belong not just to ourselves, but to God.

Second, our debt is to the community of faith. We have been sustained and strengthened by those who have gone before and those who surround us now. Here is a place for testimony, where we thank our wider community, individually and collectively, for how they have been instrumental in our lives. We have prayers where we acknowledge and say "thank you" to someone who has been a "God-send" for us in our journey of faith. I again encourage us to witness to how we have been sustained by church family and friends during the quarantine. Phone calls, notes, and sharing errands are significant in this time! It is a way of honoring one another.

It is also important to note that our debt is even larger than we might imagine. Our relationships are all inclusive in a way we often forget. Paul writes "all creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God. We are woven into the very fabric of creation. We stand as a part of creation and realize our sinfulness damages not just ourselves, but all of creation, and we come before God in worship to ask God for the forgiveness that will enable us to be partners with all Christians in revealing the children of God!

I am in debt to God, to people too numerous to name. Worship invites me to remember again how significant my debt is and to remember that it is cleared by the work of Jesus in his death, burial and resurrection. Worship invites me to direct my thanksgiving and praise for my good existence to where it belongs: The Triune God. Worship reminds me to pray for those in my community who need God's special healing in body and spirit and to remember that God's healing is far more powerful than a cure.

For these reasons, we, at Lake Toxaway UMC, have worked diligently to keep the integrity of worship during this time of social isolation. It has been a joy and journey filled with challenges. It will continue to be both joy and challenge.

Next Sunday, July 29, we will have the livestream worship at 8:30 am. We are trying to ensure the worship is available and reliable by 11 am so some of you can worship in your homes with other people. I, as pastor, want to encourage this "house church" approach where groups gather in homes to worship together. You decide who you want to invite to your homes and how many is appropriate for your space. I hear how isolated and disconnected many of you feel spiritually in this time; I think it might be a movement of the Holy Spirit to the Church's beginning as house churches but unified as one Body. You will be able to join livestream at 830 if you desire, but we want to have sufficient time to have a reliable worship and are responding to some of the concerns about hiccups we have had along this journey.

I continue to seek to serve you with a faithful heart! I miss seeing you and gathering in one space and hearing our walls reverberate from our liturgy, prayers, and songs! I hold you regularly in my prayers!

- 8:14 For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God.
- 8:15 For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!"
- 8:16 it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God,
- 8:17 and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ--if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.
- 8:18 I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us.
- 8:19 For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God;
- 8:20 for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope
- 8:21 that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God.
- 8:22 We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now;
- 8:23 and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.
- 8:24 For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen?
- 8:25 But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

- 13:24 He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field;
- but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away.
- 13:26 So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well.

- 13:27 And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?'
- 13:28 He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?'
- 13:29 But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them.
- 13:30 Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"
- 13:36 Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field."
- 13:37 He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man;
- 13:38 the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one,
- and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels.
- 13:40 Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age.
- 13:41 The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers,
- and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.
- 13:43 Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!

L: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

P: Thanks be to God!


